FROM THE RECTOR:

A few weeks ago, the President of the United States issued a statement saying that he supported the right of same-sex couples to marry. According to some administration sources, the President's position, which up to this time had been evolving, had finally evolved. Actually, the evolution of his position had come full circle, since this is the same position he held while running for the state senate in Illinois. But I want to spend less time on the evolution than the position itself.

There are so many things wrong with the statement simply on the face of it. First of all, same-sex marriage is an oxymoron. These two terms are completely incompatible. But they exist for the sole purpose of redefining marriage. It is an old trick. If you use a term over and over again, people will become comfortable enough with it so that there must not be anything wrong with it. As you know, marriage has a definition given to us by the One who instituted marriage in the first place. One man and one woman united together so that their sexual union may result in the procreation of children. According to the Word of God, any other sexual union is illicit, regardless of the circumstances. It is incomprehensible to me how any Christian, regardless of his or her motivation, can dissent from this

explicit teaching of Scripture. Secondly, to say that an individual has a right to enter into an illicit relationship is equally troubling. From where does such a right come? We learn from our founders that rights come from the Creator and that it is the purpose of government to protect rights that we have been given by Him. Does it therefore make sense that He would endow us with a right that He explicitly forbids? Whatever relationship two people of the same gender enter into, it can never be marriage. It simply isn't possible. I would encourage you to read the statement of our Presiding Bishop on this subject at www.emchome.org.

Of at least equal importance for the life of religious activity in our society is the administration's position on the requirement of all those who provide health insurance to provide contraception and even abortifacients as part of a health care package. The Catholic bishops of the nation are right in standing against this mandate of the federal government and we should stand with them. This is clearly a matter of religious freedom which is protected by the first amendment. As I write this, forty Catholic institutions have joined in a class action law suit against the federal government on this matter. I ask that you pray that the courts will hold that this mandate violates the constitutional

protection of religious freedom. If they can mandate this what else may follow?

We have just completed another year of Sunday School at St. Francis. I'm sure we will resume sometime in September, after Labor Day. I want to thank Amy Crandall who has not only coordinated the entire Sunday School for the last several years but also teaches our youngest children. Mike Ready and Doug Cooper have taught the high school students and Rebecca Hoard, Cassandra Jensen, Kim Norris, Missy Bernard and Martelle Wathen have helped Amy with the Sunday School and the nursery. My sincere thanks to all of you for your contribution to the spiritual life of the young people of our parish. This is the last newsletter until September. It is my hope that you will have an enjoyable summer, one that is not too hot or dry. Please remember to keep up your contributions if you plan to be away. God bless you.

Christian Education News

As I skipped out on writing the article for last month's newsletter, I could have a bit of catching up to do. We have had lessons each Sunday. Ever since my son started his senior year this past September, I have felt it was time to pass the mantle of leadership to someone else and to work toward "graduating" with him.
