FROM THE RECTOR

For those of you who were not present at the Annual Parish Meeting on January 23, and for some reason have not heard the news, I announced that I will be retiring as the Rector of St. Francis this year. Long story short, I do not have a specific date for my departure, and as of this writing, have not spoken with the bishop about it. I expect to do that soon. It will be the responsibility of the bishop, along with the Vestry of the parish, to begin the process to find my replacement. Meanwhile, Nancy and I would ask your prayers for the transition we are about to undertake.

Speaking of the Vestry, congratulations to Dinah Arce, David Norris, and Susan Rambin on their election to the Vestry, for a three year term. In addition, I want to thank Kevin Burnette and Mack Lindsey for allowing their names to be placed in nomination for the election. All five of these members of our parish have blessed us with their willingness to be a part of the future of St. Francis. Once again I want to thank Donna Hunt, Jim Britt, and David Kristo-Reinking for their service to the parish for the past four years. Each of them has made an enormous contribution to the welfare of the parish during their time on the Vestry. Also, I want to thank Frank Hunt. Frank has been our lay delegate to everything that has taken place on a diocesan level for the past three years, not just to the annual conventions, but for the election of our new bishop. We are grateful to Frank for his service to the parish.

Another point from the meeting on the 23rd that I mentioned but did not make too much of was the fact that we added fifteen new members to the parish last year. Nancy pointed out to me that that's a pretty big deal for a parish of our size. Even though we deleted thirteen people from the roster, we hadn't seen them in quite a while anyway, so the addition of these new

members has given us a boost, both in attendance on Sunday as well as our bottom line. We have not had that number of new parishioners in a single year for some time. It's a positive sign and an indication that God may have more in store for us in the days ahead. It is my hope that the new diocesan revitalization program which is just getting underway will be a catalyst for new and exciting things for the diocese and the parish. As I mentioned a few weeks ago in my sermon, things are just beginning to take shape on a diocesan level. As a starter, the Vestry and the parish may wish to take a new look as our Mission Statement, to see if it needs to be tweaked a bit. Or, simply to put new eyes on a old document that hasn't been looked at in a while. If you don't know what our Mission Statement is, it can be found on almost everything you get from the parish: the Sunday Pew Sheet, the parish web site, the newsletter. It's everywhere. Is it fine the way it is? Do we need to add, subtract, modify something? There's nothing wrong with it. But it was written twenty something years ago and may need to be refreshed a bit. If the parish is to have a future, it cannot be satisfied with the past. Look for God to lead and then follow.

While I have mentioned a number of your fellow parishioners in this article for their service to the parish, I recall the second reading from this past Sunday's liturgy. You might want to look at it again, 1 Corinthians 12:12-27. We are all the Body of Christ. No one is excluded; no one is unnecessary. Each is given a gift or gifts for the building up of the Body of Christ. Every member is important for the welfare and vitality of the local Christian community. Whatever your contribution, it is important.

A DAY OF INFAMY

Do you remember where were you on Monday, January 22, 1973? Like most of us, it is highly unlikely you can recall that specific day, unless you gave birth, got married, or someone special in your life died. I was 12 years old, and my family had just moved from the suburbs of Detroit to a little town called Wixom, Michigan. I had started classes at my new junior high school as a seventh grader at the beginning of 1973. To me, it would have been just another day.

But January 22, 1973 should live in infamy for all of us, because it was the day the U.S. Supreme Court announced two decisions that now, 49 years later, are still the focus of massive debate and angst nationwide. The first decision, Roe v. Wade, legalized abortion, and the second case, Doe v. Bolton, declared women could have an abortion any time during a pregnancy if it caused her duress. (This <u>short video</u> does a great job explaining both cases.)

Forty-nine years of legalized abortion in the United States has resulted in 63,459,781 abortions. Each abortion intentionally ends the life of an unborn baby growing in his or her mother's womb. We don't know for certain exactly how many babies this abortion number represents, as the abortion of twins or other multiples in pregnancies are not specifically recorded. However, suffice it to say that there have been at least 64 million human beings that have had their lives ended before they were named.

Randall O'Bannon, Ph.D., Director of Education and Research for the National Right to Life Committee, puts these numbers into perspective: "A nation with a population of 63.5 million would rank about twenty third on the list of the world's most populous countries. In terms of population, a nation that size would rank ahead of such countries as Italy, Spain, Kenya, South Africa, Saudi Arabia, Iraq, Argentina, Columbia, Venezuela, Hong Kong, Cambodia, South Korea, or Canada. This is more than the population our country's most populous state (California) and a number greater than the combined population of our 23 least populous states."

It is truly hard to imagine all the people missing in our lives because abortion prematurely ended theirs.

My prayer is that after 49 years of legal abortion, the U.S. Supreme Court will be honest enough with our country to acknowledge the atrocity that abortion is – and overturn the Roe and Doe cases. Doing so would return the legislation of abortion back to individual states, where we can and will work with each state's legislature to make it illegal.

In 2003 the Kramers formed Love for the Least. The ministry of L4L shares the compassion of Christ among people groups where less than 4% of the population has heard the Gospel. Efforts are focused on the most marginalized and forgotten, including widows, orphans, refugees, and the unborn. Their passion is to make disciples who make disciples who manifest and expand the Kingdom of God.

This group will be meeting for quite a while as the Catechism contains questions on our faith and the answers with related Bible verses. 40 DAYS FOR LIFE PRAYER VIGIL

NOT canceled! From March 2nd-April 10th we will unite with hundreds of cities across the world for a simultaneous 40-day prayer vigil. 40 Days for Life is a 40-day campaign of prayer & fasting, education, and a constant peaceful prayer vigil in front of abortion facilities. This international movement has resulted in 100+ abortion facilities closing, over 200 abortion workers having conversions and leaving their jobs, and over 20,000 women choosing life for children they

There is one important announcement about this vigil. After much prayer and discernment, the Coalition for Life has decided to switch the south location of the vigil from Planned Parenthood on East Ben White to Austin Women's Health Center on S IH-35. At the S IH35 location, the prayer location is right next to the parking lot, so the coalition determined that we can make a greater impact there.
