FROM THE RECTOR:

Whenever we are nearing an election I try to remind you that there are important matters to consider. You probably don't need to be reminded of such things but I feel better about doing it. While it may seem early, early voting starts this month.

With all the bad news lately about the economy, it is possible that many will think that the economy is the most important issue. It is important, of course, and who can afford to lose any money that they have? You may feel that one candidate or another has your own best interests at heart or one represents how you believe more than the other. All of that can and should be taken into account. But have you ever asked God how you should vote? I'm serious. We ask God for things all the time. Do we ever ask Him for advice on the really important questions in our lives and even the really important questions of our times? Ask God to show you what the important issues are in this election and who would provide the best leadership in the face of those issues. I believe Christians have that responsibility—to seek God's direction not just for their own lives but for their country.

Too many Christians have fallen into the separation of church and state lie. We have become accustomed to thinking that God has no business in our national or local political affairs. After all, we have been told that for decades. Everyone is free to worship as he or she sees fit as long as God doesn't leave the church building. That is the attitude that has brought us to this place in our history, this undesirable place.

I have in the past reminded you that God has a history with us and we with Him. It is not hard to understand how God operates. He has shown us time and again. When we invite God out of our personal lives or the life of the nation God will do one of two things. According to biblical history, He will either punish directly or withdraw his hand of protection from us. I believe that this is already begun in our nation. The increase in the number and the severity of so-called natural disasters over the past decade or so has been blamed on global warming. While the myth of global warming is subject for another debate, I don't believe that this is the cause at all. God has permitted more of the floods, storms, droughts, fires and earthquakes to call us to repentance. I recently saw a sign on a church which read "What does God have to do to get our attention?" What, indeed?

Our country finds itself wrapped in a conflict of religion and culture with radical Islamists and although I disagree with

most of what they think about everything, part of their grievance against the West is what they consider to be the moral depravity into which we have fallen. They have no claim on moral purity themselves but it is hard to argue that our current moral culture isn't more depraved than it used to be. Abortion, homosexuality, pedophilia, pornography, greed and lust of all types. The list goes on and on. I believe God is saying to us, "You may live that way if you choose but I will have no part in it."

Anne Graham Lotz in her book <u>I Saw The Lord</u> has this to say, "...I would say that for several years now, Americans, in a sense, have shaken their fists at God and said, 'God, we want You out of the schools, we want You out of our government, we want You out of our business, we want You out of our marketplace.' And God, who is a gentleman, has quietly backed out of our national and political life, our public life, removing His hand of blessing and protection."

This election is far from the most important question facing us as a nation. Who we elect to be the leader of our nation is important but not as important as whom we acknowledge to be the leader of our nation. We can start by seeking His face and asking His direction before we vote.
